Supply Chains are the framework for collaboration between business partners for the manufacturing, selling and distributing of goods.

LOGISTICS

Logistics are one part of a Supply Chain. They are responsible for the movement and storage of goods between the origin source and the destination.

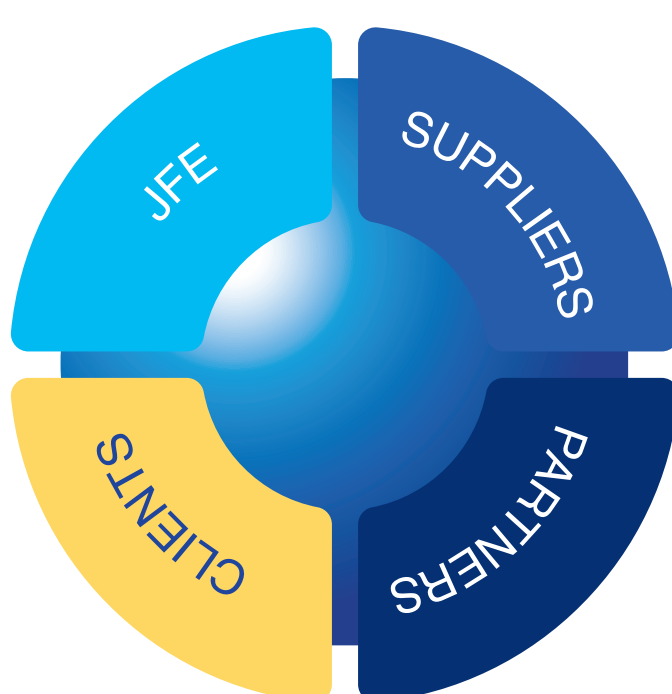
